# **Classic coming to KMMS gym**

you've been a wrestling fan for awhile, you've likely heard of them. They have been billed as "one of the greatest tag teams in the history of wrestling".

"Brothers" Gene and Lars Anderson were known as the "Minnesota Wrecking Crew". In 1968, the crew was joined by a new "brother" Ole Anderson (Rock Rogowski) who teamed up with Gene and Lars to defeat Les Thatcher, the Amazing Zuma, and Paul Demarco in the ring.

Gene and Ole Anderson went on to take tag team wrestling to new levels during their NWA World tag team title reigns in the 1970s. They won the NWA World tag team title eight times.

In a word, they were "hot"

Stomping around the ring in their matching red- and yellow-striped boots, the Anderson brothers dominated the wrestling scene with dramatic bouts and sneaky stunts. The fantastic feuds that fired them up engulfed the audience who loved and hated them, but couldn't get enough.

They wrestled with "Nature Boy" Ric Flair, Lex Luger, Ricky Steamboat, Manny Fernandez, Thunderbolt Patterson and the Rock and Roll Express. Several others wanted to join them and some "distant cousins" and new "brothers" were welcomed into the Anderson fold.

In the 1980's Ole Anderson and "cousin" Arn Anderson joined forces with Ric Flair (whom they reportedly claimed was another "cousin") and formed a new crew called the "Four Horsemen".

The Anderson Brothers, the Rock and Roll Express, the Four Horsemen - the names of legends that still

ring in the minds of fans today. Many of the great wrestlers of the 60s, 70s and 80s put on shows the entire family could enjoy. And many families did enjoy them.

Their stunts, their names. their "storylines" continue to influence an industry and inspire others. They inspired George South. He grew up watching great wrestlers such as the Anderson Brothers. He remembers the excitement around the ring, the thrill of the audience when the good guys won. And in the shadow of these wrestling giants, he found his passion.

South has been wrestling

now for 30 years. Leader of the Exodus Wrestling Alliance, he runs a training school in Charlotte and competes in the ring as Mr. No. 1. South has held familyfriendly wrestling matches for the benefit of several noble causes throughout the

region. In a way, each benefit is a chance for him to make a difference with a sport that made such a difference to him. The next benefit, to be held in the KMMS gym on Feb. 25, will pay true homage.

The original Anderson brothers Gene, Lars and, later, Ole (although Gene was the only true Anderson) have long since hung up their boots. And their boots will be hanging in the Kings Mountain Middle School gym on Friday, Feb. 25, as some new and "old" greats return to the ring in the 5th Annual Anderson Brothers Classic.

Just who will walk away with the coveted Anderson Brother Trophy is anyone's guess as the match draws near. But the action is al-

ready heating up. "Mr. No. 1" and Ricky Morton and Robert Gibson of the "Rock and Roll Express" will be facing each other again for the first time in over 10 years.

Also coming to the ring will be "The Ragin' Bull" Manny Fernandez. EWA Junior Heavyweight Champion "Mr. Elite" Jake Manning will battle to keep his title away from Cedric Alexander.

On a video posted online at www.GeorgeSouth.com,

Mr. No. 1 spells out a new plan for the "Masked Ranger", KMMS Social Studies teacher David Mc-Donald, who will be joining the EWA in the ring for a third time.

The "Masked Ranger" took down the "Sheik from the Middle East" at the December benefit match inside the KMMS gym. There was interference. Now some guys are out for revenge.

"This time it's a lights out (match)," says Mr. No. 1. "The NWA will not sanction this. No promotion will sanction this."

It's sure to be a good show.

The Classic is set to start at 7 p.m. on Friday, Feb. 25th. Tickets for \$8 each can be purchased at Kings Mountain Middle School at the night of the event.

## Deadline for student transfer requests is fast approaching

Parents who want to request a school transfer for their child for the 2011-12 year should do so by April 1.

Cleveland County Schools has established this deadline to allow school officials to better plan for next year by having more accurate student numbers.

Parents may pick up transfer forms at the school in their residence area or at the school for which they are requesting a transare fer. Forms also available online at www.clevelandcountyschools.org

A signature acknowledging the request is required from principals of the school of residence and the school requested; however, transfers are not final until approved by the Cleveland County Board of Education.

Students attending schools on approved transfers are not required to apply for next year unless they are changing schools. Students who are granted transfers are allowed to remain at a school through the grade span served by that school unless otherwise noted in the transfer approval letter. For example, a student granted a transfer to a K-4 school may remain there through fourth grade. Parents will be required to submit a new application after fourth grade if they want their child to attend a school outside their district of residence. The Board does not guarantee

Law" seeks to tighten restrictions on individuals who have prior convictions in an effort to prevent such tragedies from occurring.




